Invite - Tenderfoot Bumblebee Survey - August 5th

Lace up your boots! We're planning a **second bumblebee survey** for this summer (read more about our June outing <u>here</u>) — and this one will be a hike-in, high-elevation survey for intrepid volunteers.

As in previous years, we're collaborating with the Xerces Society for Invertebrate Conservation to complete the <u>Pacific Northwest Bumblebee Atlas</u>: a community science initiative informing pollinator conservation across our region. This year, we've been asked to check out a high elevation site — so we're hiking up the Tenderfoot Trail into the Wallowas

to snag bumblebees off fireweed, heather, and gentians.

This outing will take a full day and will require hauling gear and ice up into the mountains and back out again. It should be a great time! If you'd like to pair a beautiful summer hike with a few hours of fun, informative, and meaningful work for pollinators, join us!

Planning Together for Resilient, Vibrant Waterways

On July 20th, GHCC, the <u>Camas to Condors</u> partners, and The Nature Conservancy (TNC), hosted a workshop for regional restoration practitioners focused on interweaving climate adaptation principles and Nez Perce cultural outcomes into riparian restoration projects. About 40 people attended the workshop, including conservation partners, natural resources professionals, and Nez Perce tribal community members.

We focused our discussions on a three mile section of upper Camp Creek, on The Nature Conservancy's Zumwalt Prairie Preserve. This section of the creek is in the early planning stages for a restoration project, which TNC is designing in collaboration with Trout Unlimited and Nez Perce Tribe Fisheries. Camp Creek is a key steelhead creek with headwaters in an important tribal gathering area—so, an ideal place to bring together tribal members and restoration practitioners for discussions on cultural survival and climate adaptation.

Following the workshop, attendees have access to a restoration planning tool developed by the Nez Perce Tribe and Point Blue Conservation Science. This tool helps restoration practitioners design riparian plant mosaics that are climate resilient and also provide cultural resources, such as foods, medicines, and other materials. We hope this tool will inform the

restoration of Camp Creek, along with many other restoration projects on waterways throughout the Greater Hells Canyon Region.
