




#GivingTuesday

Minam Wildlife Area Expansion Complete


Last week, the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife announced the completion of the Minam Wildlife Area expansion. This builds on decades of efforts by Eastern Oregon advocates who worked tirelessly to protect and expand the Eagle Cap Wilderness through the years. Combined, the 361,000-acre Eagle Cap Wilderness and Minam State Recreation Area, now form a block of public land larger than Yellowstone National Park. A recently released report found that 1.3 million Oregonians (almost 1 in 3!) get their drinking water from sources that would receive increased protections from the River Democracy Act – including the Beaver Creek, the original drinking water source (now the emergency backup source) for La Grande.
