# **Upcoming Events**

Blue Mountains Trail Community Workshop in Sumpter and La Grande
(RESCHEDULED): We invite you to be a part of the Blue Mountains Trail! While we had

- Bumblebee Surveys June 25-27 at Union County Fairgrounds: This spring, we're teaming up with our partners at the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) to train detection dogs to find bumblebee nests by scent. These outings will aim to find nests that we can use for the training. # Stop B2H's Contest Case Warriors

## Environmental impacts of the Boardman-to-Hemingway Transmission Line

The plan proposed by Idaho Power to build a 300-mile high voltage transmission line from Boardman, Oregon to Hemingway, Idaho, right through La Grande's fire-prone Wildland Urban Interface, is just one of many aspects of the project that hasn't been adequately analyzed. Matt Cooper is one of many active volunteers that Stop B2H fondly calls its Contested Case Warriors. These individuals are working to challenge Idaho Power's environmentally-damaging project. Matt's case exposes Idaho Power's flawed analysis that the project poses no fire risk to La Grande. # Learn more about: Birds on the Blue Mountains Trail

"It is mid-May on the Zumwalt Prairie of Northeast Oregon. My daughter and I strike camp on "The Edge...always the place to be to see the most wildlife, and to drink in the glorious views of the Blue Mountain country. May is also the time to observe a great variety of birds on nesting territories, preparing to hatch and raise young in what is a short summer at this 6000 ft + elevation. Places like the Zumwalt Prairie grasslands are vitally important to avian conservation efforts, because birds are in trouble."
